## School updates(Vocational Training College)

ARC Vocational Training Centre (VTC) was inaugurated in 2017, initially serving as an educational institution for Child Care to support children under its guardianship who were unable to continue their education in conventional schools. Subsequently, Arc VTC expanded its curriculum to include diverse vocational training programs such as Information and Communication Technology (ICT), Dressmaking and Fashion Design, Carpentry and Joinery, Electrical Installation and Solar PV, and, more recently, Hairdressing and Beauty Therapy and supportive curriculum including guidance and counselling, entrepreneurship and leap learning.

The primary objective of establishing Arc VTC was to provide vocational training to underprivileged youth within the community, thereby contributing to poverty alleviation. Through specialized training programs, Arc VTC aims to equip young men and women with practical skills and knowledge, fostering economic empowerment and self-reliance.



### Ajira program

We had a two-day Ajira Digital training program, a government-sponsored initiative to empower our students to embark on their journey toward dignified work through digital and digitally enabled opportunities for earning.

The key pillars of the program are to enable youths to have access to dignified work, infrastructure, training, and mentorship.

The program covers 5 programs across the supply, demand, and linkage aspects of the jobs ecosystem.

### Sanitary giveaway

we donated another batch of reusable sanitary towels to Powo Primary and Saradidi Primary Schools. # Child care programs

# ARC

## Teacher's training

This was a two-day training with class teachers of Grade 6 and 9 students from primary and junior schools in Rarieda Sub County. The main topics covered were Online Child Sexual Exploitation and Abuse(OCSEA) and Child-Friendly Schools. The training aims to equip teachers with crucial knowledge about children's issues, ensuring they are well-prepared to support and protect students in their care.



## Water tanks to schools

We had installations of water tanks and Polypot water stations at Aduoyo Primary School, Nyakasumbi Primary School, and Wangu Primary School. This project is designed to provide reliable access to clean water for students, promoting better health, hygiene, and a better learning environment for all.

### A Few Notes To Remember

- Sanitary towels benefited 90 vulnerable girls in 2 primary schools.
- Water tanks and poly pots initiative benefited a total of 1186 learners in 3 schools.
- Teachers' training benefited 29 teachers from 15 primary schools in Rarieda sub county

- We created a new facebook page for carpentry production inorder to boost sales of the products made in our workshop (ARC furniture and carpentry production)
- Through Agriculture we gave out farm inputs
  Maize 2kg one packetand
  25kgs of DAP fertilizer.



## Stories of impact: This story is about how a family of 10 went from homelessness to back on their feet.

In 2022, four-year-old Daniel Omondi was admitted to our childcare program following the tragic loss of his mother. His family, already facing poverty, found themselves in an even more desperate situation. Without a home of their own, they had nowhere safe to stay.

Daniel's family, consisting of ten members, lived in a small, dilapidated mud house. The structure was fragile, with walls that could hardly withstand the wind and a leaking roof that made rainy nights unbearable. Inside, there was no furniture and no proper bedding—only a cold, hard floor where the children slept at night, using their worn-out clothes as makeshift mattresses and blankets.

Then, a life-changing moment arrived. A group of visitors from Norway, known as African Women-Norway, came to see Daniel's family. What they witnessed was heartbreaking. They saw the children huddled together on the bare floor, lacking even the most basic necessities of life. Their hearts were filled with compassion, and they knew they had to take action.

Without hesitation, African Women-Norway made a remarkable decision—to build a new semi-permanent house for Daniel's family. A place they could call home, one that would protect them from the harsh weather and give them the dignity they deserved.

Construction began, and hope started to grow. The family watched in amazement as the walls took shape, stronger and safer than anything they had known before. The new house, though simple, was a huge transformation for them. No longer would they have to sleep on the bare ground. They no longer feared the cold nights or the rain pouring through a broken roof. When the house was completed, Daniel's life changed forever. He and his siblings finally had a warm, secure place to sleep. Their laughter filled their new home, a sound that had been missing for too long. The stability of a proper shelter gave Daniel the foundation he needed to grow, learn, and thrive.

Today, Daniel is flourishing in our childcare program. He has a chance at a better future with a safe home and a loving community around him. Thanks to the generosity of African Women-Norway, his story is no longer one of struggle, but of hope, resilience, and transformation.

This is the impact of kindness. This is the power of giving. And this is just the beginning of Daniel's new journey toward a brighter tomorrow.
